

From Riches to Rags - Philippians 2:1-11


Rivalry: seeking your own gain at the expense of others.

Conceit - "vain glory"

Romans 12:3 "For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think..."




From Riches to Rags - Philippians 2:1-11

Stop living in a way that tears others down so you can be noticed and recognized and praised.

From Riches to Rags - Philippians 2:1-11

Form of GOD - Literally: "existing in the form of God"

1. Always existing - Jesus wasn't created.



From Riches to Rags - Philippians 2:1-11

- 1. Always existing Jesus wasn't created.
- 2. Fully divine Jesus is fully God



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From Riches to Rags - Philippians 2:1-11

- 1. Always existing Jesus wasn't created.
- 2. Fully divine Jesus is fully God
 - "Morphe" "form"
 - refers not to external appearance or shape, but essential attributes and inner nature."
 - being in very nature and essence God.




From Riches to Rags - Philippians 2:1-11

John 1: "the Word was God", "Word became flesh"

Colossians 1: "image of the invisible God"

Philippians 2: "very form of God."

Hebrews 1: "exact imprint of His nature"



From Riches to Rags - Philippians 2:1-11

"He did not lay aside his divine attributes, but he laid aside his independent use of his divine attributes. New Testament passages reveal Jesus using his divine powers and displaying his glories upon occasion, but always under the direction of the Father and the Spirit."
